


ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Before long two trucks, ten buses and over 350 campers joined them. The rookie counselors were responsible for jamming every inch of space in the two trucks with trunks, suitcases, sleeping bags, guitars, amplifiers, boom boxes, and boxes of edible goodies.



The campers boarded the yellow school buses at 10:30 A.M., leaving many grieving parents in the parking lot, and headed west under sunny skies for the trip to camp, arriving

around 2:30 P.M. with a shout of joy and a mad dash to the bathrooms.

CAMP 2000

This year we have brought together 357 campers and a staff of 65 for our 43rd year of camp. This is year = 18 at Camp Kingsmont. The first 25 years of camp here at Camp Winni (Geneva Point Center) in New Hampshire. For all but one of the years of camp "Rip" has been our director. With his fashionable red hat perched on his head, "Rip" welcomed the campers and staff before sending them off to unload the luggage trucks and find their cabins. There are 25 cabins + the deluxe hotel reserved for only the most elegant campers. At the cabins, the campers were welcomed by their counselors - all of whom are former campers.

When everyone had claimed a bunk and unpacked their wardrobe for the week, the entire camp gathered in the Council Ring where associate director Don McGibbon reviewed the camp guidelines and invited Glen Holt and Alex Doyle to read the names of the campers in each of the 33 morning groups.

Everyone anticipates an awesome week - it's always an awesome week at Camp Kingsmont!

SIGNS OF THE TIMES

MORNING WATCH

A very important part of each day at camp is Morning Watch. As the campers and staff leave the dining room after preakfast, they are given a "Morning Watch Sheet" which always includes a scripture reading, a brief story, a few prayer seeds" and a number of questions to think about. The campers spread out on the hillside and then spend about 10 minutes in silent reflection and prayer. At the end of the week when we ask the campers their favorite thing about camp, Morning Watch is always high on their list.

MORNING GROUP

The entire camp is divided up into 33 Morning Groups. Each group of 11 meets daily with two leaders from 10:00 - 11:30 A.M. In their groups, the campers and their leaders share a variety of questions and experiences related to the theme of the day.

The theme of the Morning Group session today (Sunday)



was friendship and love. One of the wonderful parts of today's theme was the creation of a huge banner. Each member of the camp family wrote one thing that they truly cherish on a colorful foam shape either a hand or a star. All of the

shapes were then glued upon the banner titled - "ALL... IN HIS HANDS." When completed, the banner was truly beautiful, not because it was colorful and bright, but because it expressed so many wonderful thoughts. Our campers and staff have so much to be thankful for... and all that we have is in God's hands. Thanks be to God for the many and varied gifts that He bestows upon us.

CHAPEL & VESPERS

Sunday's chapel and vesper services were led by the Youth Group members and staff from the First Congregational Church in Braintree. At the chapel



service before dinner group members read I Corinthians 13:4-13 and the Rev. Bill Ferguson talked about the greatness of love. He reminded us that we are all looking for a sign to reassure us of God's love for us.

At the vesper service around the campfire, group members read from Psalm 69 and "Rip" spoke about time, reminding us once again that "for those who love, time is eternity."

THE CHARITY AUCTION



Sunday's afternoon program was an auction. We raised just over \$2,000 for the Make-A-Wish Fund of the Weymouth Elks. Some of the items that were generously donated by the staff included: Dinner for Two on the

Odyssey, New England Patriots tickets, Red Sox tickets, baskets & boxes of food, water guns, autographed photos of Alex Doyle, mystery gifts, disposable cameras, vintage t-shirts, stuffed animals, and folding camp chairs. Cabin #7 (Jr. High girls) bid \$160 for a huge basket of edible goodies. Two Jr. High boys spent \$20 each for Brittney Spears posters. It was a Kodak moment when Mike Miller modeled a 46 DD "manzier" with the helping hands of auctioneer Terry Martinson. 


