A NEW CAMP... A NEW BEGINNING

Our 44th year of camp began at noon today as 345 campers and 70 staff members assembled in the parking lot of The Weymouth High School - Pleasant Street Campus to begin their 3 hour journey to the Lake Ossipee Conference Center in Freedom, NH.

For 25 years, beginning in July of 1957, our camp week was held at The Geneva Point Conference Center on Lake Winnepeasukee in New Hampshire. "Camp Winni" was a wonderful place and our program began to blossom. The counselors at "Camp Winni" were often the parents of campers. The Morning Program was taught by the ministers and was often referred to as "Sunday School Under The Pines." T-shirts and gym shorts were not considered appropriate attire. Rip, Don and Terry were all involved in the program at Winni. Rip, our director, has missed only one year of camp in its 44 year history. Don, our assistant director, first attended camp as a camper in 1958 followed by many years on the staff at "Winni." Terry joined the "Winni" staff in 1972. Bill Ferguson and Donna (Ripley) Fallon were both campers and counselors at "Winni." Glenn Holt and Laura (Mills) Hathaway were "Winni" campers. Geneva Point Center decided that they wanted to focus their attention on adult groups. Therefore a search was started for a new home for our camp week.

In August of 1983 camp moved from "Winni" to Camp Kingsmont in West Stockbridge, MA. Our camp program really began to grow. With the new camp came came a number of great changes. The counselors were mostly young former campers - college students and young adults. Morning Group became much more creative and interactive. The Talent Show and Skit Night became very popular evening activities and camp dances continued to be the highlight of the week. We enjoyed 18 wonderful years at Camp Kingsmont, but Kingsmont wanted to move in a new business direction which meant that we again had to find a new home.

2001 will be our first summer on the shores of Lake Ossipee - we hope it will be the first of many! Yes, things might be different, but if you have been involved in camp before, you know it's <u>not</u> the place that makes this a great week... it's the people, and the program and the spirit that make camp what it is. We are looking forward to an awesome week.

CHAPEL

The daily chapel service was held after dinner because we were later than expected arriving at camp. The Old South Union Church Youth Group led the service with the assistance of Glenn Holt on guitar. The scripture reading was the story of the final judgment from Matthew's gospel (Matthew 25:31-46) followed by a story titled *Wilbur's General Store*. Kindness done to strangers is kindness done to Jesus Christ.



EVENING CAMPFIRE

Mike Miller and Rob Waugh hosted our first "virtual" campfire by the beach. Each of the staff members had the opportunity to introduce themselves to the camp. The most veteran cabin counselors are Laura Hathaway and Norma Magrane with well over 20 years

at camp. Many other staff members are celebrating their "decade" at camp. This year's staff features 20 rookies, perhaps the largest group of rookies we have ever had. All the rookies are former campers. In addition to the introductions, a number of the staff shared their talents. Among those who sang were: Matt Fiander, Glenn Holt, Jeff Kobel, Sarah Zerbonne, Jon McCabe, Greg Zopatti, Alex Doyle, Bridget Madden, and Kevin Worth. Once again we have an incredibly talented group of counselors and a staff that is filled with energy and enthusiasm.

THE HARD-CORE BELT

A brief video presentation attempted to trace the "HARD-CORE Championship Belt" which was in Rip's proud possession at the end of the 2000 camp season. The Most Reverend John Castricum, "Protector Of All That Is Good and Holy", chastised the would be belt thieves and sent them with tires screeching into the darkness of the night. Who knows where the belt may end up during our 2001 camp season?

MORNING WATCH

An important part of our camp day is Morning Watch, a ten minute quiet time following breakfast that the whole camp participates in. The 2001 Morning Watch theme is *Growing Up*. The scripture readings are all from the gospel of Matthew and highlight the life of Jesus. Morning Watch also includes stories written by or for teenagers about growing up, questions to ponder, prayer seeds, and a poem.

WHAT IS MORNING GROUP?

The heart of our daily program is Morning Group. The campers are divided into small groups of about 10 - 12 with two leaders. From 10:00 to 11:30 A.M. each morning they meet in these small groups to share a very carefully designed program that the staff has been working on all year. The camp theme is usually chosen by October. The 2001 camp theme is: Seasons Of Life. We will be exploring the various stages of human life from birth to death and beyond. The 90 minutes daily program includes: brainstorming, discussions, games, Bible Studies, a Camp Journal, and other creative activities designed to trigger our minds.

DID YOU KNOW

In 1957 camp began at Geneva Point Center with 116 campers. In our final years at Kingsmont we had just over 350 campers and a waiting list. Today at the Lake Ossipee Conference Center we have grown to a camp with 345 campers and a waiting list of about 20.

In the earliest years campers had to dress up for dinner.

In the first years of camp, counselors were addressed as Mr., Mrs., or Miss... never by their first names.

Currently there are 5 member churches of the South Shore Congregational Youth Conferences - can you name them?



Sunday's afternoon program was a huge Birthday Party for the entire camp. We assembled on the field by Morning Groups for 16 contests. The goal was for each team to win as many stars as they could by beating the competition. Contests included: water balloon throwing, three-legged race, cake eating, shoe shucking, musical chairs, and spoon race. As we go to press we are still waiting for the computer results of this wild competition to determine a definite winner. Many thanks to Kristyn Mills for organizing this afternoon event.

CHAPEL

The young people and counselors of The First Congregational Church in Braintree were our worship leaders. The Rev. Bill Ferguson spoke about the people who come into our lives: some come into our lives for a reason - to meet a need... some come into our lives for a season - they are with us only for a brief time... others come into our lives for a lifetime - they are the ones who make a real difference in our lives with their love, their kindness and their care. The people who come into our lives for a lifetime are the ones we will never forget.

SPREE TIME

Lunch is followed by Spree Time when a variety of activities are offered. On a hot day like today, swimming in Lake Ossipee is very popular. Other Spree Time activities include: hiking, juggling, kick boxing, soccer, tennis, sunbathing, talent show rehearsal, basketball, and a great new game called GAH GAH - it's like arena dodge ball.

THE BEACH DANCE

From 8:00 to 10:30 P.M. our campers and staff danced the night away in the Rec Hall. The theme for the first of our two camp dances was "Beach Party." Many of the dancers wore brightly colored shirts or dresses. Neon Glow Stix added color to the evening. Tom Remsen provided the tunes. Another great feature was a huge video screen that displayed colorful images throughout the dance. Stairway To Heaven brought the dance to a close.

VESPERS

We end each evening at camp with vespers, a brief meditation under the stars. On our first night of camp John Castricum led vespers. Tonight First Cong's campers read a wonderful story titled: *The Morning Of The World*, followed by a special message from Rip. At the close of vespers the entire camp joins hands and sings the Lord's Prayer together. The singing of the Lord's Prayer has been a tradition for all 44 years of camp no matter where camp has been held. Some things never change!

We also completed a survey of the top ten priorities of today's teens. Items on the survey included: health, happiness, family, friends, money, etc.

Other discussion topics in today's program were school and confirmation.

A few questions from today's program were:
Which tv or movie teen do you wish you were most like?
How would you describe a typical teen?
What makes you unique?
What do you enjoy doing for kicks?
What is your relationship with your family like now?
Do your parents treat you fairly?

THE SURVIVOR GAME

The rain forced us to cancel Spree Time today and move the afternoon program into the Rec Hall. Erin Spurling created a great Survivor Game to be played on the athletic field. Moving the program inside limited some of the things she had planned, but it did not ruin our fun. Each Morning Group provided one volunteer to participate in the game. The 32 volunteers were divided into two tribes that faced off in a variety of relay races and competitions. The losers of each contest had to vote one player off their own team. The contests included: True or False Counselor Trivia, limbo contest, balloon relay, tug-of-war, etc. There were also two contests involving very tasty treats liked pickled pigs' feet and octopus. Many thanks to Erin for her energy and enthusiasm and to the players for their efforts.

WORSHIP AND VESPERS

First Church in Weymouth and Union Cong combined efforts to lead both worship and vespers today. At the worship



service Harry LaCoste shared a story titled: "To Read When You're Alone Letters." The story was about teenage rebellion and how much comfort one person got from the letters of encouragement he received regularly from his mother.

At vespers Dan South spoke about his own teenage years. He spoke about the years when he doubted his Lord, his parents, and his friends, but in spite of his doubts, they never doubted him and were always there for him. Real love has a way of doing that!

THE GREEN GUY CREW

Tonight's evening program could very well be the greatest production in our 44 year history. Harry LaCoste, Kevin Worth, and George Raymond, with great support from many staff members, created The Green Guy Crew - a take off on *The Blue Man Group*. They worked for months preparing tonight's production. With the House Band (Greg Zopatti, Jon McCabe, and Matt Fiander) playing in the background, The Green Guy Crew entertained us with creative drumming, wildly funny skits, great audience participation, and several videos. They were aided by PVC pipe instruments, neon 'green drumsticks, leaf blowers and miles of toilet paper. The 75 minute show ended with a spontaneous standing ovation from all the campers.

One of the best things about tonight's show was that the staff kept it a complete secret from the campers. There were hints that "Green Was Coming" which led campers to guess that Tom Green or Kermit The Frog or several of the Boston Celtics would be visiting camp.

MORNING PROGRAM

- What is the relationship between life and death?
- Do teenagers think about death a lot?
- Is death desirable sometimes?
- Does faith affect your views on death?
- Do you believe in heaven? What is it?
- What did the resurrection of Jesus mean?

WHERE IN THE WORLD IS BILL HARDING? (written by Carol Harding)

On March 9, 2001, the Rev. Bill Harding, Chaplain for the 399th Combat Support Hospital Army Reserve Unit, was deployed to Kosovo, formerly Yugoslavia. His reserve unit is now part of the Multi National Force of NATO, KFOR (Kosovo Force.) He is part of the Task Force Medical Falcon and is assigned to Camp Bondsteel Hospital, which is a tent structure. Most everyone on the base resides in buildings called seahuts, which contain five six-man rooms. He assures us that the living conditions are as comfortable as the U.S. can make it. Armies from all over the world are stationed here, including Italy, Russia, UAE, Jordan, Ireland, and the UK.

The hospital and Task Force Med Falcon provide care for this region, and receive patients of all types from all over Kosovo. Soldiers and civilians are treated and well taken care of. He has witnessed and cared for victims of mine explosions, gun shot wounds, car accidents, fires, chopper crashes and other disasters. He has said that the most difficult thing for him to comprehend is the hatred and anger among the people, but there has been some progress in their understanding the peace process and an increased concern for the children and their future.

All of us back home here, his family, friends, church, youth group, campers and all people whose lives Bill has touched, miss him greatly and look forward to and pray for his safe return home in mid-October.

THE FOLLOWING IS AN ARTICLE THAT REV. BILL HARDING WROTE FOR THE FALCON FLIER RECENTLY

As our time goes rushing by in Kosovo, it is important that we take time to remember all the things we need to be thankful for. We make lists for lots of things, shopping, work, etc. But very few sit down and take time to list the good things that happen to us every day. I would like to list a few of the gifts of God for which I am thankful, and I know that some of you will be also.

The first is our minds; minds to think, to learn, to know. What wonderful things our minds are, beyond comprehension. The most intricate computers are crude compared to the complexity of the mind that God has given to us. Truth is also to be known, grasped and held by our minds. We also have a heart.
