CAMP 2002

The 45th year of camp began in the parking lot of Weymouth High School at 9:45 A.M. when the first camper, Katie Frado, unloaded her gear from the trunk of her mom's car. Nineteen "rookie" counselors greeted her with great enthusiasm. About an hour later the other campers started arriving - 324 in all. With the hot sun beating down upon them and working as a team, the staff loaded the trucks and tried to solve the problem of



where to put all the stuff that would not fit into the luggage trucks. Eight yellow school buses and one motor coach arrived to provide the necessary transportation to camp. By noon the buses were filled with eager

campers and stuffed with the remaining sleeping bags and other soft luggage. The 136 mile journey to camp took just under four hours.

2002 is our second year at The Lake Ossipee Conference Center (LOCC) in Freedom, NH. Already it feels like home. We've adjusted well to eating in two shifts and to a few cabins without showers. We've taken care of the biggest complaint from our first summer at LOCC by building a Council Ring around a fire pit. Looking out across Lake Ossipee to the mountains in the west is an awesome sight. The hot weather promises that the lake will be well used by the campers and staff.

Upon arrival at camp, Rip briefly welcomed the campers and staff. Cabin assignments were made and everyone went off to find their cabin, select the best bunk, and locate their luggage. We are not quite as crowded this summer as we were in 2001. It appears that there is a bed for everyone. That's always good news!

At 4:45 P.M. everyone met together to review the camp's rules. Assistant Director Don McGibbon reviewed our guidelines for the week and introduced "Ollie" from the LOCC staff to go over the camp's rules and the safety procedures. Next on the agenda before dinner was to read the Morning Group assignments and give the campers a brief opportunity to meet the leaders of their groups.

Scripture readings are the parables of Jesus. The stories are modern parables. It is hoped that each camper will save the Morning Watch papers in his or her notebook.

From 10:00 to 11:30 A.M. each day the campers meet in small groups of 10 - 12 with two counselors for Morning Group. Morning Group is a time for bonding and growth focusing on a theme. This year's theme is six of the books by Dr. Suess which will lead to discussions on prejudice, power, ecology, acceptance, faith, and our future. Campers describe Morning Group as both fun and thought provoking. A "Bible Break" and a "Camp Journal" are both parts of Morning Group, as are games, discussions, trust experiences, brainstorming, discussion and some opportunities for creativity.

VESPERS

Harry LaCoste led vespers on Sunday Evening. Harry talked about juggling our responsibilities, our relationships, and our decision making. That's not always an easy task. The talented Harry juggled a bowling ball, a knife, and a fireball as he made his point to the campers.
